Capital Credit Allocations Listed on April Bills

Cooperatives aren't like for-profit companies that are owned by investors. As a member of New Hampshire Electric Cooperative (NHEC), you're a part-owner of the Co-op. This means, among other things, that when the Co-op earns a profit, you are "allocated" a portion of that equity in the form of Capital Credits. You'll see that Capital Credit allocation listed on your April or May bill. It's not a credit, but a record of your patronage during the year 2024. When the Co-op's finances allow, the Board of Directors can choose to retire a portion of your Capital Credits and return it to you. Growing up in Dummer, Meghan Doherty wasn't the first kid to want out of the North Country. The little town north of Berlin near the Maine border felt awfully small when she graduated high school. Naturally, the wider world beckoned. But after college in Chicago, graduate school in Wisconsin and 13 years in Kentucky, where she and her husband raised their daughter, Meghan felt the pull of home.

"As our daughter grew older, I kept wondering why we lived so far from home," she recalled. "I'm an only child, my daughter's an only child and it just felt like we were too far away."

Back in New Hampshire now since 2022 when she was named Director of Plymouth State University's Museum of the White Mountains (MWM), Meghan has gathered a collaborative of six local libraries, historical societies and museums, "to really think in depth about the past, present, and future of the White Mountains in a holistic way."

In fact, the very buildings that house those institutions demonstrate the ability of New Hampshire's mountain towns to adapt over time. Among the locations are buildings that were formerly used as a courthouse, a church, a farmhouse and a cafe that was seized by the town for back taxes. The Museum of the White Mountains itself was once a Methodist Church. It's about as New Hampshire as it gets.

"It's a great conversation piece about renewal and how these communities have to keep reinventing themselves to stay relevant as the world around them changes," Meghan said.

Reinvention and resilience are explored in depth in an exhibition that is coming to the MWM May 31 - August 9. Titled "Crossroads: Change in Rural America," it's a collaboration between the Smithsonian Institution and state humanities councils nationwide. Its appearance in New Hampshire is among the last of 37 states the exhibition will visit.

A companion exhibit, "The White Mountains: A Crossroads," will examine the past present and future of the region that

was once marketed to 19th century travelers as "The Switzerland of America." That idealized vision of the region's past is confronted today by 21st century realities, Meghan said, like a lack of affordable housing and a warming climate that threatens its economy and way of life.

For encouragement, though, she points to what she calls the "grand compromise" of the Franconia Notch Parkway, an agreement in the 1980's that resulted in the only one-lane interstate highway in America.

"That story really exemplifies the importance of the White Mountains to the state more broadly and the importance of wild and beautiful natural spaces to our state...I think it's an amazing story about both the activism in our community, the collective action to protect the natural environment and the importance of that particular stretch of what used to be Route 3 that brought all these people together to protect it."

TUFTONBORO SUBSTATION REBUILD

The rebuilding of the Tuftonboro substation is well on its way as part of the Co-op's 12-year plan to upgrade substation transformers. When work is completed, the new and improved Tuftonboro Substation will provide capacity for future load growth and the ability to remotely switch power to other circuits in case of outages using Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) technology. Improving infrastructure and upgrading technology is part of our larger commitment to reliability, one of the pillars that guides our five-year strategic plan.

The Tuftonboro project, the Co-op's sixth substation rebuild, literally involves work from the ground up. It started with an entirely new foundation and moved up to the recent addition of the "brain" – known as the control house enclosure. This equipment handles many functions such as communicating directly to the control center in Plymouth through SCADA. With real time information, our control center can better manage keeping the power on or restoring the power more quickly in times of outages.

SCADA technology is already reducing restoration times for Co-op members. In another part of our service area last month, a loss of the feed from our transmission provider caused an outage for 2,000 of our members. Thanks to SCADA technology, we were able to reroute and restore power to more than half of those members within three minutes, and another 500 within seven minutes. Twenty minutes after we were alerted to the loss from our provider, all of the members had power – well before our provider's estimated time of restoration.

This is only one example of the importance of upgrading our system and better managing energy delivery, while also creating greater capacity for the future. Additionally, it highlights the importance of this 12-year plan and reaffirms our mission and commitment to our members.

Last year, the Jackson and Bridgewater substation projects were completed. Tuftonboro hopes to be energized as soon as June. After Tuftonboro, the Waterville Valley substation is the next project for this year.



GET \$75 FOR THAT OLD FRIDGE OR FREEZER

If you are looking to replace your refrigerator or freezer or just want to get rid of a secondary unit you no longer need, you can receive a no-cost pickup, have it responsibly recycled, and receive a \$75 rebate if you act now or between Dec. 31.

Recycle a dehumidifier or air conditioner in combination with your refrigerator and/or freezer for an additional \$30 rebate* (*limited two per household per appliance type per calendar year)

Receive Your Rebate: Allow 6-8 weeks after pickup for incentive processing
